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Welcome to our Autumn edition of State of the Arts.



Our annual *Arts in the Park* event in early December kicked off the summer season, offering the stunning King Edward Park as a backdrop to local arts and craft stalls, music and performances. I hosted Jim & Brigette from REACT (Rangiwahia Environmental Arts Centre Trust) in the Arts Tipi, where we created woven wreaths with families and kids of all ages, from sustainable willow they grow. It was great to see them share their knowledge and passion with our community.

Two new public artworks were completed recently, both reflecting local stories and honouring our place in the world. *Te Pou Whenua Takinga I Te Mauri* is a carved pou, positioned at the entrance of Bridger Park in Arakamu Eltham. The intricate pou features traditional and contemporary elements carved in the unique Taranaki whakairo style, and an interpretive board describes the meaning of all the elements.

I was lucky to be able to watch the progress of the new

mural in Pātea by artist Dan Mills, as the site is next door to my house on the main road. Seeing the daily progress was awesome, both for myself and the rest of the community who enjoyed meeting Dan and seeing the details of the design unfold. Thanks to everyone involved in making these projects happen, they really do have a positive impact and offer visual connections to our culture and heritage for both locals and visitors to our district.

Please continue to support our galleries, groups, projects and events. Thanks for your positivity, commitment and vision to keep the arts alive and thriving!

South Taranaki Creative Communities Funding

The South Taranaki Creative Communities Scheme provides funding assistance for community-based arts activities in South Taranaki that meet one or more of the following funding criteria:

- **Broad community involvement** A project that will create opportunities for local communities to engage with and participate in arts activities.
- **Diversity** A project that will support the diverse arts and cultural traditions of local communities, enriching and promoting their uniqueness and cultural diversity.
- **Young people** A project that will enable and encourage young people (under 18 years) to engage with and actively participate in the arts.

The next South Taranaki District Creative Communities application round is now open, closing at 5.00 pm Thursday 7 March 2024. This is for creative projects that will take place between 4 April 2024 – 4 April 2025.

Pou Project - Arakamu/Eltham

A Pou that symbolises moving forward together and celebrates Arakamu/Eltham, the town of firsts, was blessed and unveiled at the Bridger Park entrance on Sunday 5 December at daybreak.

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South Taranaki Mayor Phil Nixon says the Bridger Park entrance project, which has included contributions by local iwi, members of the Eltham Community Development Group, Eltham Lions, Fonterra, and the South Taranaki District Council, is a great example of the community working together.

"Te Pou Whenua Takinga I Te Mauri" includes traditional and contemporary elements carved in the unique Taranaki whakairo style. Designed by Philippa Turahui and carved by Shaun Taylor, it's significant in recognising the whole Eltham community, past and present.

"The Pou reflects upon some of the unsung heroes who have made generous contributions to the Eltham community, pays tribute to those who have passed on as well as represents those who are here today continuing the legacy of those gone before. It pays homage to the growth and development of Eltham and most importantly moving forward into the future as one," says Mayor Nixon. The idea for the project first began in 2016 when Eltham Kaponga Community Board members Maree Liddington and Steffy Mackay presented the idea of creating an entrance area at Eltham's Bridger Park, to help beautify the town's

CBD. The Eltham Lions came on board as a partner in 2018, and over the next 3 years, a lot of hard work was put in to reconstruct the Bridger Park entrance. Mosaic pavers representing Rotokare Scenic Reserve were also recently installed in the paved area. These were created by Fleur Le Bas and Steffy Mackay during a school holiday programme held at E-Town Youth Centre. "The Bridger Park entrance project has been a collaboration of creativity and hard work, from the Pou which stands sentinel at the entrance, to the colourful mosaic pavers, plantings, and the corten steel salute to Rotokare. A big thank you to all involved," says Mayor Nixon. Acknowledgement is also given to Robert England, Jo Menzie, DMACK Engineering, the Turahui whanau, Dixon Motors, Fonterra, and the Taura Here Kohanga Reo for their role in this project.

Pātea Mural Project

Mural Artist Dan Mills recently completed painting the large concrete wall on the side of the McCarty & Hungers building at the top of Bedford Street, Pātea. It depicts images from Pātea's ocean, landscape and industrial past, as well as Johnny Hunger at work at the forge hammering steel on an anvil. Dan has painted walls, bridges and more all-over New Zealand since the 1990's, including the RSA building in



Hāwera and the rail bridge at the southern entrance to Hāwera. The Pātea mural was facilitated and funded by the Pātea Historical Society with additional funding from the South Taranaki Creative Communities Scheme, the Pātea Community Board Discretionary Fund and support from the STDC Arts Coordinator. Some years back Dan moved from Whanganui to Eltham, but is currently living in Prague, Czech Republic. He will also paint the outside wall of the Eltham Village Gallery in March 2024, with a scene influenced by Rotokare Scenic Reserve.

Aotea Utanganui Museum of South Taranaki – Celebrating 50 Years

50 Years Celebration: 2.00 pm 25 April 2024 Aotea Utanganui, 127 Egmont Street, Pātea

2024 marks 50 years since the Aotea Utanganui Museum in Pātea was officially opened. The museum was established by the Pātea Historical Society and is now under the auspices of the South Taranaki District Museum Trust. Running costs and staff are provided with the generosity of the South Taranaki District Council.

Initially intended to be an early settler's museum, a 'Māori Court' was soon added with artifacts, carvings and tukutuku panels. Te Napi Waaka and his mother Mereana helped supervise this work.

Te Napi Waaka was then working locally as a Methodist District Supervisor. Over his life, he became well known as a teacher and leader in the revitalisation of Māori arts and culture in New Zealand. The inclusion of a Māori section to the museum was initiated by PHS and Museum Board member, Eva Ngakirikiri Kershaw. Sadly, she never got to see the opening of the museum as she passed away in 1973 before its completion. The Māori Court was dedicated to her at the opening. Much of the planning, development, and ongoing work in the early days of the museum was done by G

Livingston Baker, a grandson of early Hāwera settler, James Livingston. The museum initially featured the Pātea District but now includes the entire region of South Taranaki. It is kaitiaki of some notable collections including the ancient and unique Waitore Artifacts, the Hāwera Star collection and the Ellmore-Timms and Nicholson photographic studio collections. Recent large acquisitions include the collections of the Southern Rugby Club and the Hāwera High School. The museum is consistently working to make itself representative of its entire community and is strengthening relationships with South Taranaki iwi and hapū. A number of Māori memorabilia and artifacts have been added or repatriated to the care of the museum with others currently in the pipeline. Projects are not limited to exhibitions but have included a book and ongoing oral history and documentary film work. Initially a typical small-town museum, Aotea Utanganui Museum has grown in size and reputation over the years to become known as an innovative institution with high standards. Feedback from visitors is consistently good with many amazed by what can be found in the small town of Pātea.



Willow Noir is a collage artist whose work makes a statement on a subject including war, society mores and global warming. 
This year, Waverley artist Jenni Corbett is exhibiting alongside three Whanganui artists, Pauline Handley, Celeste Ventura and Wally

Theatre Director Workshops – From the Beginning, with Russ Standing Introduction Session: 9.30 am - 4.00 pm Sunday 28 April 2024 Repertory House, 59 Collins Street, Hāwera

Russ Standing shares his lifetime experience to anyone interested in directing theatre. Throughout the past 60 years Russ has been involved in the arts in Taranaki as an actor, director, designer, scenic painter, repertory committee member, artist and administrator in a number of arts organisations. He successfully challenged the boundaries of small rural town theatrical groups by staging and or directing and in some cases designing a number of the most popular block buster musicals of all time. In

addition, he re-established the South Taranaki Arts Council in the 1980s, formed the Grand Variety Trust in 1998 - funding applicants to study singing/acting and more recently established the highly successful Hāwera Memorial Theatre Friends Trust that has been instrumental in refurbishing and re-equipping the Hāwera Memorial Theatre. Until 2014 Russ managed the Theatre on a voluntary basis on behalf of the South Taranaki District Council. Russ is a former President and Life Member of the Hāwera Repertory Society, Paul Harris Fellow, and has a number of Community and Citizen's Awards and more recently received a Merit Award from Musical Theatre New Zealand.

These unique workshops will share his extensive skills and knowledge to enable participants to prepare and conduct rehearsals and apply directorial skills and techniques.

Malamalama: Suzan Kostanich, Theresa Tongi & Alison Leauanae 1 - 27 April 2024

Taranaki-based artists Suzan Kostanich and Theresa Tongi join with Te-Whanganui-a-Tara resident Alison Leauanae, to bring together a contemporary body of work that reflects their personal histories and shared Samoan heritage. Malamalama, a Samoan term that denotes

understanding, comprehending, insight, and enlightenment, speaks to the artists' exploration of that which holds meaning and provides context to life's challenges and triumphs beyond themselves. Their diverse practices, including painting, mixed media, fibre, and stitching, explore motif and pattern in both traditional and non-traditional representations.

Past and Present: Sarah Buist 29 April - 25 May 2024

This solo exhibition focuses on works from two distinct periods of Waitara artist Sarah Buist's life - life drawings produced in 1990's London juxtaposed against her more recent abstract fine-line drawings produced over the past 8 years in Aotearoa NZ. Sarah is guided by her imagination and utilises fine line pigments to create the desired effect.

Langkah: Krismarlianti 27 May - 22 June 2024

Contemporary abstract exhibition by award winning Indonesian artist now living in Manaia, South Taranaki. Langkah is the Indonesian word meaning 'steps', or 'to move' (physically and mentally). This retrospective exhibition will showcase Krismarlianti's ongoing artistic process, embracing the many challenges and rewards in her life and the transfer of ideas and emotions to the canvas. 'This exhibition is a reminder, self-reflection and motivation for me about myself and my art journey'.

Project Reef South Taranaki

Local environmental group Project Reef South Taranaki have created a large-scale art frame, featuring vibrant photography of ocean life from their research and protection of the rich and diverse reef environment offshore our coastline. This regionally and nationally recognised project aims to discover and document the subtidal rocky reef communities in the South Taranaki Bight. The frame is situated on the land of the Te Rangatapu Trust Land at Ōhawe beach and is a feature of a new carpark area which will be officially opened in early March.

This is the third art-focused project the group have realised, including a mural on the main road of Patea and the Patea Pou Project, which leads down to Mana Bay. These projects actively engage the wider community, incorporate all streams of learning to the wider project and help to raise

awareness of the group and its activities. Other partners in the wider scope of the Project are: South Taranaki Underwater Club, Hāwera High School, Pātea Area School, Te Kaahui o Rauru and Te Runanga o Ngati Ruanui Trust. The colourful frame highlights many of the special and unique species photographed in the coastal environment, celebrating the diversity and abundance of ocean life in the area.

The Village Gallery - Autumn Exhibitions

The Village Gallery celebrated the opening of the new gallery spaces and exhibition 11 February. The front Gallery space is now the Community Gallery Shop area where members can exhibit throughout the year.
